Notes On Today's Concert

Benjamin Godard was a French violinist and composer of the Romantic era best known for his opera "Jocelyn." In addition to eight operas and five symphonies, he composed piano and violin concertos and sonatas, string guartets, piano pieces, and more than 100 songs.

According to Bruzanemediabase.com, Godard's Aubade for Violin and Violoncello is "a colorful piece, written in a popular, picturesque vein, whose folkloric inflections might be compared to those of Dvorák's 'American Quartet'." They call it "a lively duo according total equality to the cello and the violin." And they suggest that the pizzicato accompaniment that the cello provides for the violin melody (and that the violin later provides for the cello in return) brings to mind the plucking of a guitar. This provides "a texture typical of the aubade, a musical genre that owes its name to the fact that it was originally performed at dawn (French aube) beneath the windows of a loved one, frequently on the mandolin or the guitar."

Hans Werner Henze was a prolific 20th-century German composer with more than 250 works to his credit, including operas and musical theatre, symphonies and other orchestral works, choral pieces, and compositions for instrumental soloists and chamber ensembles. Stylistically eclectic, he was influenced by "serialism, atonality, Stravinsky, Italian music, Arabic music, and jazz, as well as traditional schools of German composition." [En.Wikipedia.org]

According to the biography section of Hans-Werner-Henze-Stiftung.de, a website dedicated to the composer's life and works, "Henze was undoubtedly one of the most important composers of his time. Living in Italy for over 59 years, he developed his own musical language, shaped by the Italian spirit. Henze's music, which, as he himself said, 'emanates from the theater,' always takes a political stance, and from and within it, the great humanitarian concerns speak in a moving way."

The 1993 world premiere of "Adagio, adagio" featured Yehudi Menuhin on violin. James H. North, in notes to a 2010 Ensemble Recherche CD of some of Henze's shorter chamber pieces, calls today's serenade "a four-minute movement for piano trio that could be Rachmaninoff with a splash of dissonance."

German composer **Ludwig van Beethoven** is among the most widely regarded composers in the history of Western classical music. Born in 1770 in Bonn, he displayed musical talent at an early age, studying piano first with his father, Johann van Beethoven, and then with opera composer Christian Gottlob Neefe. It was under the latter's tutelage that the 13-year-old Beethoven composed – and published – his first pieces, a set of keyboard variations. He moved to Vienna in 1792, where he studied composition with Franz Joseph Haydn. He quickly established a reputation as a virtuoso pianist, and recognition of his compositional genius was soon to follow.

Beethoven wrote seven piano trios that were published during his lifetime. The most famous is his Opus 97, known as the "Archduke Trio," published in 1811. The trio we will hear today was one of a set of three published in 1795 as Three Trios for Pianoforte, Op. 1. According to an essay on PopularBeethoven.com, the "first public performance [of the three trios], in which Haydn was also present, took place in 1793."

Notes (Continued)

The fact that Beethoven chose to present these pieces for publication as his "Op. 1" indicates his confidence in them as examples of his mature compositional style that would appeal to the musicians and audiences of the day.

Czech composer **Antonin Dvořák** is probably best known for his "Slavonic Dances," prime examples of his incorporation of elements of folk music from his native Bohemia. Americans have a great fondness for some of his later works, such as his "American Quartet" and "New World Symphony," written in the 1890s while living in the U.S.

According to Dvořák scholar David R. Beveridge, writing trios for piano, violin, and cello "seems to have held a special allure" for the composer. In the case of today's piano trio, Beveridge mentions that Dvořák was so immersed in its composition that he skipped the world premiere of his own sixth symphony by the Vienna Philharmonic. (Eight months later this trio premiered in the Bohemian city of Mladá Boleslav, with Dvořák himself playing the piano part.)

In the essay quoted above, which accompanied a 2012 CD of this and the later "Dumky" trio, Beveridge remarks that both today's trio and the "Dumky" are "predominantly in minor keys and gravitate primarily toward darker moods. It is true, however, that Dvořak's outlook on life was, in the last analysis, positive, and he was a master at salvaging a convincing 'happy end' from the seeming depths of despair." About The Ensemble

Playing for the Santa Fe Symphony, Santa Fe Pro Musica, Albuquerque Chamber Soloists, and Chatter; James and Megan Holland are a presence in the classical music community of New Mexico. In addition to appearing many times with Willy Sucre at Placitas Artists Series presentations the Hollands have hosted several performances here as well. James Holland became a member of the Miami-based New World Symphony, where for two years he performed, toured, and recorded under the baton of Michael Tilson Thomas. In 1996, he successfully auditioned to become principal cellist for the Charleston Symphony Orchestra and cellist for the Charleston Symphony String Quartet. For many years he has been an active and enthusiastic cello teacher and chamber music coach. Megan Holland, whose performances are noted as "poised" and "powerful," has held principal positions in the Charleston Symphony, Breckenridge Music Festival Orchestra, and Opera Southwest. The Hollands will be joined by pianist Judith Gordon who performs regularly with the musicians of Chatter. Her presence at Placitas Artists Series is becoming more prominent as she leads concert ensembles and accompanies other lead performers.
